# Brief report of the survey in Tak FY 2021

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## 1.Background

The study was conducted as part of a study of Thailand's ICT environment and learning disparities between immigrant and poor children. Our research team wants to know what the home environment is for immigrant children from Burma and how much online teaching materials are used in each home. However, in 2021, it was not possible to go directly to the site to investigate.

Therefore, we conducted a survey with the research cooperation of the Burmese Migrant Workers' Education Committee (BMWEC), which has been involved in the education support of the immigrant community for many years.

Survey period: Jan 2022 – Mar 2022 Place: Tak Province

#### 2. Research Method

Firstly, we send the questionnaire (Google form) to BMWEC. BMWEC conducted a survey using a questionnaire created by our research team for parents with children in grades 5 and 6 (around 10 years old), and collected data from 80 people. The specific survey method is as follows. All survey data was saved in Excel file format.







# 5.Household



In particular, more than half of the women were unemployed, so we asked BMWEC the reason.

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After I conducted meeting with my BMWEC Team, we founded out that there were some reasons that there were many mother (women) who were (unemployed) in this data. And we divided women or mothers in to three groups as below.

1. Some of the women or mothers had job or work before COVID-19 happen and they stayed have some job or work currently.

2. Some of the women or mothers had work before the COVID-19 happened, However, when the COVID-19 happened and affected many factors and including health and economic, some of the parents have less opportunity of the job and some parents were losing their job.

3. Some of the women or mothers, they don't have job and they don't work. They depended on their husband income and take care of their baby or children at home and do the house works. **Remark**: Before the COVID-19 happened, the women or mothers who have work, they have usually income but when the COVID-19 happened, they have less job opportunities and they have less income.

For example, "Work for hire" - Before COVID-19 happened, there were many "work for hire" available for both men and women in the Mae Sot area. However, when the COVID-19 happened, there were not many works for hire available. Therefore, many of the women and many mothers were unemployed in these data.

## 6. Daily Life with their children

These questions were asked to understand the child's daily environment and parent-child relationships. The answers show that about half of parents do not have time to spend their leisure time with their children, but more than three-quarters take time to teach homework. It was also revealed that the mother is mainly in charge of teaching homework, and the father and brother/sister are about the same proportion. 6-1. #### 7. Parenting style

The following questions are about how you want your child to grow up or what you expect from your child. Nearly half of parents found it important for their children to enjoy school. In addition, more than 90% of parents say that it is important for their children to think for themselves.

No.4-6 questions are related to the study with ICT technology. Interestingly, even though more than 90% of parents want to teach at school using computers and tablets, "computers promote children's understanding" and "electronic-based" The percentage of parents who think that their homework helps their children's understanding has dropped from 60% to 70%.

# 8.Relationship between parents' educational background and the level of education required of their children

Our research team is collecting survey data from other regions now and will hold a meeting on which data to analyze in May or June. However, one of my research interests is the theme of "the relationship between parents' educational background and the level of education required of their children." Therefore, a cross-tabulation analysis was performed on these two data.

If parents graduated from junior high school or high school, the education level required of their children are almost higher than themselves (when "poo woo choo" is regarded as a high school graduate) or about the same.

The most common answer is that they want their children to have a bachelor degree. These answers account for more than half of the total. The next most common answer is that it depends on the child.
